

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



What is public health criminology?



(Macassa & McGrath, 2024)





People on probation face health inequalities.

Provision for mental health in Wales is the worst it's been for years. Engagement from health isn't great, due to the demands on them.

Study 1 - Probation & Inclusion Health

People on probation - worse health outcomes than general population & face particular health inequalities.

Mapped 'criminal justice populations' for PHW communicable disease programme - explored people on probation as an 'inclusion health' group.

Mixed-methods - included survey of 34 community-based services who work with people on probation across Wales.

Survey respondents indicated service availability, waiting lists, and mistrust of professionals are key barriers to accessing healthcare.

Most identified health needs were mental health and substance misuse related.

Study 2 - Warm hubs

Qualitative research into development of 'warm hubs' in one Welsh city where community spaces provided access to refreshments, food and local support.

Drawing on focus groups & interviews with 38 people visiting and coordinating the hubs, as well as access to LA questionnaire data, findings suggest the warm hubs largely met their intended aims of being 'safe, warm and welcoming'.

Found to be beneficial in responding to the cost-of-living crisis in post-COVID Wales, but also contributed to the safety and well-being of communities.

Key finding - hubs seen to have broader societal benefits in developing social connections, promoting inclusivity and reducing social isolation.

Basic healthcare [for people on probation]...if you don't do that the message you send out is *you're not really worthy*. And if you've got anxiety, depression, mental illness, all that does, is feed into that.

Ongoing work: Study 3 – Listening for better health & Study 4 – 'BillyChips'

Study 3 – Survey & interviews with people on probation and professionals to gain a better understanding of barriers and enablers to access health care (Funded by St Davids Medical Foundation / HMPPS NRC approved)

Study 4 – Survey, interviews and focus group, exploring use of tokens called 'BillyChips' and alternative ways of giving, sharing, and supporting people experiencing homelessness and extreme poverty (Funded by PHW)



Some emerging themes for a developing Welsh public health criminology

- Working with complex groups overlaps in inclusion health people on probation, homelessness, substance misuse etc
- Exploring links between stigma/ trust /mistrust and access to services
- Exploring links between social inclusion/exclusion, wellbeing and desistance
- Understanding the role of the community in health and justice and alleviating interrelated issues – trauma, poverty, homelessness, substance misuse
- Plus, the role of specialist professionals e.g. health & justice coordinators
